Enhancing Health Literacy with Life Skills Education

Professors Nic Gabhainn, Barry and Dr Kelly were recently appointed to assist the World Health Organization Health Promotion Unit in the development of a life skills education package for enhancing health literacy in schools. This package focuses specifically on the prevention of noncommunicable diseases (NCDs) by controlling four common risk factors: Nutrition, incorporating oral health and hygiene; physical activity; alcohol and tobacco use.

The study comprised a review of the current literature, including relevant international databases and resources published or recommended by international organisations that build on work already undertaken by WHO Headquarters and Regional Offices, and the production of two reports; a background document and guidance for educators.

The findings will support the WHO Health Promotion Unit in developing a teachers' workbook for use in schools, especially in low and middle-income countries, to enable children's health literacy concerning the prevention of NCDs through the reduction of key modifiable behavioural risk factors. The translation phase will follow the finalisation of the commissioned reports.

IMPACCT

IMproving PAtient Centered Communication Competences (IMPACCT) is a three year Erasmus+ project lead by the University Medical Centre Groningen in the Netherlands, with partners from Ireland (HPRC, represented by Dr Jane Sixsmith and Verna McKenna), Belgium, Italy, Slovakia and Germany.

The project aim is to improve the relevance and quality of education for undergraduate medical and nursing students in Europe through the development, implementation, evaluation and dissemination of a comprehensive health literacy (HL) focused Patient-centred Communication Education Programme (HL- EP) which can be integrated into existing medical and nursing undergraduate curricula.

The stakeholder fora is involved in all phases of the project for the purpose of gaining insight into the needs, barriers and facilitators of Health Literacy education for health professionals. This is a dynamic iterative process of participation at multiple time points through programme development with the results feeding back into programme design and implementation. Researcher Profile: Dr András Költő

I am a health psychologist whose primary interest is adolescents' sexual, mental and psychosomatic health. I worked in the Hungarian research team of the Health Behaviour in School-aged Children (HBSC) study from 2010 until June 2017 when I joined the HBSC Ireland team as a Postdoctoral Researcher. My research focuses on Gender and

Sexual Minority adolescents, who are especially vulnerable to marginalisation and discrimination and

their negative health consequences.

Since 2016 I have been serving as the chair of the working group within the international HBSC network, dedicated to explore adolescents' sexual health in more than 40 countries. Currently, we are working on journal papers exploring health inequalities in <u>same- and both-sex attracted adolescents</u>.

In addition to my research I also teach on the Health Promotion and the Children's Studies programmes. Working at NUI Galway has given me an experience of international mobility, a sense of freedom and a wonderful working environment with supportive and welcoming colleagues. I was honoured to be appointed as the HPRC Researcher Representative and a board member of the NUI Galway's LGBT+ Staff Network Steering Committee.
